


Background

- Commission established October 2024
- Legal, economic, social & administrative factors
- Public consultation & Stakeholder engagement
- Report published September 2025
- Ministry implementation group established

Share (%) of Irish Farms by Farm Holder Age Group, 1991-2023










Insights from the National Farm Survey










Share of Farm Managers by Age Group across EU MS 2020



Broad Research and Stakeholder Insights

Succession drives innovation:

Technology adoption, viability, sustainability

Structural **Barriers persist**:

Access to land/finance/labour.

Lack of managerial control.

Family dynamics matter:

Emotional attachment, identity, life expectancy pensions, life-stage, values.


Tax complexity inhibits planning;

Reliefs and grants underused due to lack of awareness/fear.

Farming perceived as **less** attractive:

Viability, volatility challenges attractive non-farm economy, quality of life .

Context specific challenging for policy design
e.g. Farm system differences
Family/Non-Family transfer





Overview of Existing Supports

- Main mechanisms:
 - CAP (3% of direct payments to young farmers)
 - National Reserve
 - TAMS (YFCIS)
 - Taxation reliefs
 - Collaborative Farming Grant Scheme (RFPs & SFPs)
 - Succession Planning Advice Grant
 - Education and Advisory activities
 - Targeted loan schemes
- But: limited demographic impact so far.





Commission Recommendation Themes

- CAP
- Taxation
- Pensions
- Advisory Services
- Collaborative Arrangements
- Education & Training
- Access to Credit & Land
- Gender Balance
- Attractiveness of the Sector





Key Recommendations - CAP

- Increase total CAP support for generational renewal
- Young Farmer
 - Introduce an Establishment Payment
 - Retain existing supports with additional conditionality
- Incumbent Farmer
 - Introduce a Generational Renewal payment payable on transfer of the farm
 - Consider new 'older' farmer supports e.g. community-based peer networks
- Succession Planning
 - Retain existing financial supports integrated more closely with advisory services
 - Succession Planning compulsory element on Ministry funded KT programmes



Key Recommendations - Pensions

- Support for age/pension conditionality on basic area-based income support but,*
 - preferably as an optional measure for Member States with flexibility in implementation
 - stakeholder consultation required
- Address inequities in PRSI coverage family members, transitional arrangements
- Automatic pension enrolment provide for self-employed, including farmers.
- State and stakeholder representative organisations need to raise awareness
 - Retirement planning and Pension provision
 - Improve and align information on broad ranging supports long term care, social welfare etc.

Recommendations – Advisory & Education

Teagasc advisory services

- Dedicated Generational Renewal programme
 - Transferring the Family Farm Clinics
 - Multi Actor Succession Teams (MAST)
 - Review and promote guidance documents/templates
 - Engage with broader AKIS and associated rural professionals

Agricultural Education

- Prioritise generational renewal in the curriculum
- Support graduates in terms of succession
- Continued Professional Development for farmers
- Promotion of agriculture in schools



Other Recommendations

- Retain existing tax supports
 - Broaden eligibility conditions
- Expand access to credit in conjunction with financial providers
- Improved access to land
 - Nationwide "Land Mobility Service"
 - options for landowners and opportunities for young farmers and new entrants
- Promote collaborative arrangements
 - Reduce administrative burden and increase financial support
- Improve attractiveness of the sector
 - Multi-Stakeholder role
- Improve gender balance
 - Targeted policy, taxation, legislation
